Dear IBA Supporters. As a reminder, our mission is to identify, enhance, and preserve public and private beach access on Whidbey. We welcome your continued support!

Here's a brief summary of what we have done since our last report:

ACCESS MATS ON ROBINSON BEACH PARK. PROJECT COMPLETED!

After 7 long years of delays due to COVID and very extensive permitting process, we have made Robinson Beach more accessible! We installed two van-sized ADA-approved parking spaces adjacent to the park and we placed seasonal mats from there to the high tide line.

This \$15,000+ project required 7 different permits and would not have been successful without support from Rotary Club of Whidbey Westside, Island Asphalt, many volunteers, **and** financial support from many of you. The mats are seasonal and are now stored for the winter months. We will reinstall them at both the Robinson and Clinton beaches in May.

WHAT WE HAVE DONE:





We continue to work with the Port of S. Whidbey to resolve the problem, but progress is agonizingly slow. They have submitted permit applications NOAA, the Army Corps of Engineers, WSF(DOT), and DNR to allow removal of these logs.

*In the meantime, we continue to lay down mats in the spring and remove them during winter months, providing at least some access.

WHAT'S NEXT?

- We are collaborating with Whidbey Audubon and WA State Parks to rebuild the Crockett Lake bird viewing platform as ADA approved.
- We have consulted with the Oak Harbor Park Dept. to assist them in with making Windjammer Park ADA accessible.
